# Our Approach to Community Partnerships

At John Muir Health, we recognize that addressing community needs requires both internal and external collaboration. By working alongside nonprofits, local organizations, schools, and healthcare providers, we extend our reach beyond hospital walls to **support access to care, address homelessness, and support behavioral health needs.** 

Our Community Benefit services span the entire geographical region of Contra Costa County, Northern Alameda County, and the Tri-Valley.

# **Specialty Care** Meeting Vulnerable Patients Where They Are

In the background, the nurse practitioner could hear the sound of scrubbing as the patient on the phone described her symptoms. The woman apologized for calling from work—she was cleaning a house and couldn't afford to miss a day's income, even while terminally ill with cancer.

On the other end of the call, speaking in the patient's native language, Spanish, is John Muir Health's Specialty Care Lead who is ready to connect the patient with oncology services, transportation, and follow-up care.

### **A Direct Connection**

"We meet the patient where they are," says Shellie Campos, Nurse Practitioner and Coordinator of John Muir Health's Specialty Care Program. She and Paula Bellis, the program's clerk, and Claudia Bruno, another clerk, link patients in the community with specialty care after they are referred by La Clínica de la Raza.

"We are available and reachable through a direct line—there is no phone tree," Campos emphasizes. "Patients struggle to navigate the health system and locate the specialty care they urgently need, which can create a cycle where patients instead go to the Emergency Department for treatment."

John Muir Health physicians and outside providers actively participate in the Specialty Care Program. Common specialties include, gynecology, gastroenterology, medical oncology, radiation oncology, surgery, and urology.

John Muir Health's program stands apart from others as it provides intentional charity care. Campos adds, "We pay the professional fee and we offer inpatient care—not just outpatient services. We also track the patient's progress to ensure continuity of care. Our goal is to provide great medical care to all people, with follow-through and interpretation services."

### A Safety Net for Patients

Patients qualify for specialty care if they are uninsured and earn under 400% of the Federal Poverty Level.

Since the program's inception in 2011, over 3,000 patients have received high-quality care from participating specialists, 8,650 consultations with specialists have been covered, and there have been 120 patients diagnosed with and treated for cancer. This program is making such a critical difference in our community's most vulnerable populations and is truly saving lives.

# La Clínica de la Raza

# Partnering For Advanced Care

La Clínica de la Raza provides low-income communities with accessible, affordable, and culturally-aligned healthcare services throughout Alameda, Contra Costa, and Solano Counties. John Muir Health partners with Contra Costa County clinics that offer comprehensive care, exams, immunizations, prenatal care, dental, and optometry services, behavioral health support, and more.

John Murphy, MD, Chief Medical Officer at La Clínica, describes the organization as a medical home for some of the area's most vulnerable community members, including immigrants who often struggle to find care. He notes that healthcare services have become increasingly scarce further east of Contra Costa County, making La Clínica an essential resource. The clinic serves second- and thirdgeneration families.

However, La Clínica's ability to provide medical care has its limits. In the past, when patients required surgery or advanced specialty care for conditions like cancer, they often faced insurmountable barriers.

### A Route to Advanced Care

"For years, our providers faced the frustration of knowing there were solutions for patients needing advanced care—it was extremely demoralizing," says Jane Garcia, La Clínica's CEO.

That changed when John Muir Health began offering colonoscopies to patients in need in 2011. Since then, the Specialty Care Program has expanded significantly.

"Now, it's incredibly fulfilling to see these services in action and the impact they're having on our community," Garcia says. Barriers such as financial limitations, language differences, and logistical challenges were overcome, creating new opportunities for care.

When La Clínica refers a patient for specialty care, "We take the workup as far as possible. so the patient feels safe, secure, and doesn't have to travel unnecessarily," says Dr. Murphy. "We want the handoff and communication with the specialist to be seamless. "I truly want to thank John Muir Health -not only for covering operating room fees but for making the critical connections between us and the specialists. You vouch for us, and you have fully embraced this work. I want you to know-it's been a home run," says Garcia.

All the nurses and doctors at John Muir Health treated me exceptionally. I never noticed any difference in their treatment of me because I did not have insurance for the surgery myself. They were all truly kind and caring.

# Social Work at John Muir Health

### Challenges Amid Overwhelming Need

As a social worker on the trauma and medical-surgical floor at the John Muir Health, Walnut Creek Medical Center, Justine Rawlings has seen it all. "We have medically and socially complex patients because when you're unhoused, you are more likely to experience trauma. Different circumstances add social complexities to a patient's physical and medical challenges."

Rawlings, a UC Berkeley Master's graduate, understands this firsthand—she was once unhoused herself. Though she is a success story, she understands the overwhelming need for social support during hospitalization.

### Community Partners for Social Services

John Muir Health's Social Services team collaborates with several nonprofits to help patients address critical social needs. Hope Solutions—an organization that once helped Rawlings secure housing and support—is one such partner. Others include the Trinity Center, which provides essential safety net services for unhoused people, Beyond Violence, a hospital-based violence intervention program that collaborates with a network of nonprofits to support violence prevention in the county. Another is the county's Respite Center in Concord, which offers medical stabilization for unhoused adults.

"These community partners carry an immense burden, and as a county, we have many gaps that we are trying to fill," says Ashley Lettis, Cross-Campus Manager of Social Services.

### The Bed and Continued Care Gap

"Today, we're seeing more chronically homeless patients," Lettis adds. "Many are older and need medical support. If I could have one thing, it would be a lot more shelter beds—so we could get people who need help today into a safe place to sleep the night." Stephanie Ikenador, Cross-Campus Social Services Supervisor, agrees. "I feel for our team members who work directly with patients every day, having to be incredibly creative when developing care plans."

"We walk patients through the entire recovery process." Lettis adds, "It's a success when we can discharge someone to the Respite Center in Concord because they have a nurse and case managers. Their goal is to help people recover, connect them with resources, and get them into permanent housing. The Trinity Center also provides support, case management, and more, including a winter shelter program," she notes.

Social worker Robert Vergara works with the innovative Beyond

Violence program, which provides trauma-informed bedside intervention and ongoing support for survivors of violence. "Beyond Violence offers mental health services for trauma, as well as legal resources and other support services," he explains.

Rawlings concludes, "Our social workers and partners are doing great work. While we wish there were more resources, we recognize that every community is grappling with this systemic issue."

# **Trinity Center**

### A Safety Net in Contra Costa

"Homelessness could happen to anybody," says Leslie Gleason, Executive Director of the Trinity Center in Walnut Creek. "For me, success means that people come here and find respite and hope. Ultimately, we want to make anyone's experience of homelessness short-lived, non-repeated, and infrequent. We see that success every day."

"We are deliberately part of the wider Contra Costa County homelessness response system of care, and we have a very clear role to be a hub," adds Pam McGrath, Associate Executive Director.

### A Welcome Ally

One specific way that John Muir Health supports the Trinity Center is through the Happy Feet program, staffed by Family Medicine Residency physicians who provide foot exams. Dr. Nida Fatima, a Family Medicine Resident emphasizes that by being present at the Trinity Center, she is able to build trust with community members and refer them to their primary care provider, or our John Muir Health Mobile Health Clinic, whenever needed. Other community involvement is always encouraged. "Volunteers can be part of the solution with us, and get a sense of what really contributes to, and helps get people out of the experience of homelessness. Working together, we can really address this problem. John Muir Health's support of Trinity Center has that ripple effect, both through their grant funding and supportive on-site Residency services." says Gleason.

### A Place for All

In 2024, Trinity Center served an average of 80 people per day, (1,400 individuals visited 19,000 times) providing more than 43,000 individual services ranging from essential safety net services to intensive case management. This resulted in 124 housing successes and 50 employment successes.

The seasonal winter shelter provided 4,000 bed nights for unhoused individuals. The Center also offers a clothing room, mail and phone access, referrals, support groups, help with benefit applications, and workforce development.

Most members hear about the Center through word of mouth, through the county's 211-phone line, the Center's website, or through their hospital social workers. Ultimately, we want to make anyone's experience of homelessness short-lived, non-repeated, and infrequent. We see that success every day.

# Mental Health Connections

A Focus on Acceptance and Success

# The Journey from Isolation to Integration

When you walk into the bright, welcoming offices of Mental Health Connections in Concord, you can't tell the staff from the members. The space fosters connection, offering individuals with mental health challenges the opportunity to build relationships, develop skills, and focus on their strengths. With discussion groups, vocational activities, cooking classes, and more, the program creates a true sense of belonging.

### A Longstanding Partnership

John Muir Health's relationship with Mental Health Connections spans 17 years. "John Muir Health was our very first funder and have been with us every step of the way," says Chief Strategy and Compliance Officer Tamara Hunter. "When we faced the pandemic, they sent infection control staff to help. We're also part of the Family Medicine Residency Program, where medical residents bring valuable health education, like the importance of sleep hygiene, to both staff and members—and their staff and physicians even dance at our galas to help us fundraise!"

One of those John Muir Health staff members is Linda Ianotta, Coordinator of Accreditation and Regulatory in Quality Management, who also serves on the Mental Health Connections Board of Directors.

"It's incredible to see how this collaboration has grown and how many lives it has touched," she says. "This is one of our true success stories. When it comes to John Muir Health's mission of delivering care with quality and compassion, there's no better example. We want people to succeed—not just in recovery, but beyond."

Today, Mental Health Connections has more than 1,200 members. One of them is John Coombs, who now gives tours and presentations.

# Reaching Those in Need

The program serves adults with serious mental illnesses, including those who are unhoused, veterans, and individuals involved in the judicial system. Many patients first learn about the program when Mental Health Connections members visit the John Muir Health Behavioral Health Center to arrange donated flowers for their rooms. It's during these visits that patients hear about the importance of continued connection after hospitalization.

### Spreading Awareness, Not Stigma

To further promote the program, members organize community events. At a recent Sweep Away Stigma fair in Todos Santos Plaza in Concord, more than 400 people attended. "It's about breaking the stigma that prevents people from talking about mental health and getting the help they need," says Coombs.

Tamara Hunter adds: "I'm always impressed by how much John Muir Health does for the community. I know the impact it has had on us. They don't just offer support—they ask, 'What do you need? What challenges are you facing right now?' that's extraordinary."
